PRESIDENTS COMMENTS

WOW... IT IS HOT...
Summer is in full swing,
record heat is in the making.

Time to settle into the studio and finish those unfinished paintings that you set back in the corner. The beautiful thing about painting is there is nothing you cannot change. Paint over, or correct. If there is a texture already on the canvas in the wrong place, you can often take a palette knife and scrape off and sand OR... you can always use a palette knife to repaint thicker texture. Another great solution is to put a tree or bush over it, using the texture to your advantage. If you have a great painting in part of the picture, cut it down to the best portion and frame. This is especially easy if on a solid surface. Even a canvas can be cut, and if not enough room to turn edges, it can be mounted on a solid surface. Many of the old masters paintings of the past were re-painted making new paintings over the old ones, or completely changed the images positions. Ex-rays have shown this to be true. (You have the right to change your mind..., it is your painting.)



If it is a water color and can not be washed off in an area or covered with a darker paint, why not cut out and frame the best part of the painting, or make a collage of cut or torn strips or parts making it into another composite painting. I have seen this done often to great results, and even entered in shows. In fact, our art guild has had artists that specialize in collage works with old watercolor fragments and new color added, even with mixed media. Nothing need go to waste. Sometimes the fun of recycling gives new inspiration... Try it.

SUBJECT: CLOROX VS PEROXIDE.....INTERESTING

1. Take one capful of peroxide,(the little white cap that comes with the bottle) and hold in your mouth for 10 minutes daily, then spit it out. (I do it when I bathe.) No more canker sores, and your teeth will be whiter without expensive pastes. Use it instead of mouthwash.

2. Let your toothbrushes soak in a cup of peroxide to keep them free of germs.

3. Clean your counters and table tops with peroxide to kill germs and leave a fresh smell.

Simply put a little on your dishrag when you wipe, or spray it on the counters.

4. After rinsing off your wooden cutting board, pour peroxide on it to kill salmonella and other bacteria.

5. I had fungus on my feet for years until I sprayed a 50/50 mixture of peroxide and water on them (especially the toes) every night and let dry.

6. Soak any infections or cuts in 3% peroxide for 5-10 minutes several times a day. My husband has seen gangrene that would not heal with any medicine but was healed by soaking in peroxide.

7. Fill a spray bottle with a 50/50 mixture of peroxide and Water and keep it in every bathroom to disinfect without Harming your septic system like bleach or most other Disinfectants will.

8. Tilt your head back and spray into nostrils with your 50/50 mixture whenever you have a cold, plugged sinus. It will bubble and help to kill the bacteria. Hold for a few minutes, and then blow your nose into a tissue.

9. If you have a terrible toothache and cannot get to a dentist right away, put a capful of 3% peroxide into your mouth and hold it for 10 minutes several times a day. The pain will lessen greatly.

10. And of course, if you like a natural look to your hair, spray the 50/50 solution on your wet hair after a shower and comb it through. You will not have the peroxide-burnt blonde hair like the hair dye packages but more natural highlights if your hair is a light brown, reddish, or dirty blonde. It also lightens gradually, so it's not a drastic change.

11. Put half a bottle of peroxide in your bath to help get rid of boils, fungus, or other skin infections.

12. You can also add a cup of peroxide instead of bleach to a load of whites in your laundry to whiten them. If there is blood on clothing, pour it directly on the soiled spot. Let it sit for a minute, then rub it and rinse with cold water. Repeat if necessary.

13. I use peroxide to clean my mirrors. There is no smearing, which is why I love it so much for this.


14. Another place it's great is in the bathroom, if someone has been careless & has peed on the floor around the toilet & it's begun to smell of urine. Just put some peroxide in a spray bottle & spray. In the blink of any eye all the smell will be gone & the bacteria eliminated!


